PROJECTS PPV BEEN WORKING

This half term we have supported **164 parent carers** through parent hubs, drop ins and 1:1s.

Our top topics were **Neurodiversity support**, **Neurodiversity Profiling toolkit**, and **school issues**.

Coproduction Projects - This half term we have been co-producing the Local Offer live coffee morning which was held at the Central Library on 3rd December. Services such as Kooth, CAMHS, MHST and the ND team attended to support over 30 parent/carers from all over Portsmouth.

We have also been helping to co-produce the ND teams new information leaflets, and feeding back parent/carer views on logos, wording and language too!

Inclusion Conference - In October Cat and Flo attended the Portsmouth Inclusion Conference. The key note speaker Kit Messenger talked to us about building relationships with children and young people with SEND, and how we should be 'curious not furious' when something goes wrong for a young person. They also presented a workshop to schools and Councilor Suzy Horton about how to set up a parent hub in their schools. Two schools from the workshop have already started this process! Well done Cat and Flo!



SEND AP PANEL

Over the past 6 weeks PPV have been invited to become a member **High Needs SEN Inclusion Support Panel.**

A little background of why changes to the Inclusion Support Panel (ISP) have been made: The **SENDAP Change Programme** provided an opportunity for Portsmouth LA to look at their current SEN/EHCA/EHCP decision making processes in Portsmouth.

The intended impact of this specific area of the DFE reforms was to understand whether the quality of the local authorities EHCA/EHCP decision-making process is improved when working in a truly collaborative and multi-agency approach.

It also aims to improve confidence and understanding of parents/carers and education settings during the decision process, and while planning next steps.

The reforms focused on two key decision points - the decision to conduct an EHC needs assessment and the decision to issue (or not)an EHCP at the end of a statutory assessment.

In Portsmouth however a wider range of decisions are currently being presented to our existing panel and the LA intend to continue considering a full range of decisions in this adapted approach.

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that the **Parent Carer voices are heard** during each session and to also anonymously vote alongside other professionals on a mix of new requests for anEHCA, wherever to issue a EHCP and to consider complex case management, PPV will even have a say if a plan should be ceased.

All PPV Staff/Reps will be provided training and ongoing support while attending these panels and will feedback any concerns at the end of each session to PCC staff.



These sessions are open to parent carers of children and young people with additional needs and disability. Feel free to bring a friend or family member.

SPOTLIGHT ON A SERVICE: PORTSMOUTH SENDIASS

What is SENDIASS?

Portsmouth SENDIASS offer free, impartial and confidential information, advice and support to families where a child or young person aged 0 to 25 years has or may have special educational needs or disabilities.

What support do they offer?

- Signpost and provide impartial information and advice which enables parents/carers and their children to make informed decisions.
- Help to explain the content of reports/letters/draft EHCP.
- Make telephone calls on parents' behalf and support them with writing letters.
- Support parents to arrange meetings with schools and other professionals and attend the meetings with parents if required.

• Liaise with schools, the local authority and other agencies to promote positive relationships with parents, carers and young people.

- Equip parents, carers, children and young people with the skills and confidence to work with professionals and have their voice heard.
- Signposting parents, carers, children and young people to other sources of support.

SENDIASS are funded by Portsmouth City Council, but the service is managed independently by Barnardos. Providing free, confidential and impartial support, which means they do not take sides, and try to ensure that everyone's views are expressed and heard.

The Portsmouth SENDIASS site has a wide variety of information and advice available across a range of SENDIASS topics. Please do contact them for further information, They are a small team but aim to respond to your enquiry within 5 working days.

Where the service is provided?

They work with families living in PO1 to PO6 and can also support your child or young person to access our service independently.
